Meet the Board-Beth Schaub

Position on the Board: Historian

How long have you been a member of MDA: Since the 70's with a little break for college and graduate school.

How long have you been riding: 50+ years! Since age 9, with a break for college.

Do you ride traditional or western dressage: I started over fences. Ralph Trocher started coming to the barn I was at. The barn owner offered me a slot and I said yes. The ground was getting harder every year, and I was thinking, "If I get hurt, how do I pay my bills?" I was hooked!

What got you interested in Dressage: My very first group lessons (age 9-11) were at the Flint Riding Club, Chuck and Carole Grant were boarding there. While waiting for my ride home, I had a chance to watch Mr. Grant school his horses. WOW! My father had a few Saturdays when he was working and

couldn't immediately be there to pick me up after my lesson. He got permission for me to bring out sack lunches and hang out until he got there. I got to watch for 1.5 hours! For a horse crazy kid of 9, it sure was hard to sit in the observation area, watch and eat. I would forget to eat.



Tell us about your horse(s): My current horse is one of my "heart" horses. I have been very fortunate to have two in my riding career. Spinner is a foundation Quarter Horse who stands 2" too tall to be a pony. I purchased him when he was seven. He was a competitive FQH reining horse before I purchased him. He is now 26. He has taught me so much - how to sit still in

the saddle (wiggling on a reiner is like slapping the palm of your hand on a computer keyboard), to be aware of my surroundings (less than a month after I purchased him, a crow landed in the opposite end of the arena where we were working. We were working on 20 m circles. Before I knew it, he had done a spin and I was facing the other direction on the centerline standing rock still, staring at the crow. Okay this bugger is handy!), and how to have an unspoken but clear conversation, using your body, with your horse. I discovered that I had to be patient in the conversations, because the messages had to go from my brain - through my body - to his body - to his brain - back through his body. It is only a very few milliseconds, but it requires preparation and planning.

He is now 95% retired due to navicular in his front feet and arthritis in his hocks. We go for walks and school all of his buttons at the walk. He's still got them!

What has been your most memorable moment as a member of MDA: The 2 years Will Davis and I developed and wrote the "Participating Schooling Show" program as a way to earn money to help pay for the Awards. It was a major change of thought for the MDA. When we started the project, there were five, two-day schooling shows at Rattlewood. The riders had to send in the mail what they thought were their best test scores, front pages of their tests, and a required form before a strict deadline. Today, we have 44 schooling shows scheduled so far for 2024, and everything is computerized. With all of this growth the Awards person will never turn down volunteer help to enter and

sort data. If you don't mind typing on spreadsheets and have some time, feel free to speak up!

What would you tell someone considering joining MDA: If they want to know the latest schedule for regional dressage schooling shows, get news on clinics/lectures/ training opportunities held through MDA and neighboring farms, receive great awards, meet great people that are as horse crazy as you, JOIN MDA!

What's In My Horse's First Aid Kit?

My horses are boarded at my vet's stable. I'm spoiled. Because her clinic is attached to the barn, I feel like I have a vet on call 24/7, with all the supplies I could ever need when there's an issue. I am truly thankful every day for everything she does for my horses and how much I have learned from watching her work on horses and asking a million questions. Boarding there has been like a safety blanket for me as I have transitioned back into horse ownership after almost two decades off from riding and owning a horse. Because of that security, I messed up the first time I took my horse off property. I never considered that something could happen while we were away and was wholly unprepared when it did. After that, I vowed that I would not be without at least some minimum supplies in the event of an emergency. Lucky for you, April is American Red Cross Pet First Aid Awareness Month, so I thought I'd share what I keep in my first aid kit that I keep in my trailer!

Of course, every person and every horse's needs are different. This is not meant to be an exhaustive list, just some ideas if you're trying to put together your own first aid kit. I found most of my supplies at Meijer, Amazon, and a local tack and/or farm store. I store everything in a Rubbermaid tub.



The Obvious Stuff

- Vet Wrap
- Wet Wipes
- Alcohol Pads
- Gauze Pads
- Non-Stick Pads
- Disposable Gloves
- Scissors (I have trauma shears and regular scissors)
- Wonder Dust
- Alushield
- Swat
- Vasoline
- First Aid for Horses Book

The Big Stuff

- Diapers
- Epsom Salt
- Cotton Roll
- Microfiber Towels
- Brown Cling Gauze
- Poultice (I admittedly don't keep this in my first aid kit, but instead in my tack box at the barn)
- Handy Light

The Small Stuff

- Tweezers
- Utility Knife
- Pill Splitter (I have 2 for some reason)
- Pill Holder
- Head Lamp (don't forget to keep it charged!)
- Thrush Buster

The Meds (These do not stay in my trailer between shows. Make sure you store in the correct climate.)

- Electrolytes
- Banamine (I got this prescribed from my vet with specific instructions on how/when to use it)

First aid kits are for more than just shows. Of course, it's always a good idea to keep supplies handy wherever you keep your horse. My vet recently suggested that I also keep a "mini" first aid kit in my car for the times when I'm not on the property and don't have my trailer. I currently have a horse at the trainer, so the timing of her suggestion was perfect. Part of my upcoming



weekend will be spent putting together a pared down version of everything I just listed.

First aid kits are also for more than just horses. While it's not a full first aid kit, I also keep an "Oh Crap" box of supplies for myself in my car. If we're ever at a show together and you've forgotten something, I may be your girl with the extras.

Here's what I keep inside:

- Sanitizing Spray (I try to spray down any feed pans, stall walls, etc. before I put my horse in the stall)
- Bleach Wipes
- Wet Wipes
- Band-Aids
- Sunscreen (yes, I have 3 in there- sun care is important! Take it from a redhead)
- Deodorant
- Chapstick
- Feminine Products
- Hair Nets
- Shout Wipes
- Safety Pins
- Sewing Kit
- Hairbrush/Comb



<u>Have you Checked Your Trailer</u> <u>Recently?</u>

As we are heading into the 2024 show season, we literally can't put the cart before the horse! We have a few tips to get your horse trailer and supplies in tip top shape for the show season.

- 1. Take a walk around your rig. Are the tires deflating? Cracking or bubbling? Any areas of rust that need to be attended to? Do the windows need a dab of caulk to help with sealing? Taking a nice, slow walk around the outside of your rig can help ensure you notice small problems before they become big ones!
- 2. Have some type of roadside assistance. Not everyone has a truck or trailer to come save you when you're stranded. Your horses rely on you for their safety. Invest in SafeRider or AAA.
- 3. Is your license plate visible? Do you have reflective strips? Keeping trailers big or small visible is key to safe travels.
- 4. Drive with jacks, extra bolts, wrenches and tools on hand to assist in a pickle!
- 5. Most importantly, take a climb underneath your trailer. How do the boards look if they are exposed? Have any squishy or sinking spots? If so, it's time for a replacement.
- 6. Get behind the wheel and check all your lights today. How are the turn signals and brake lights working?
- 7. 2024 is the year you finally cover your hitch in the winter if kept outside. If you forgot to, no worries! Check that you can easily raise and lower your hitch onto your truck. Do your chains still attach easily and are in good working order? If not, time to get into a shop that can help!

Come join us for a 2-day clinic with Judge Cheryl Connell-Marsh, R. Have you ever wondered what a judge's perspective was on a ride, or if they see riders making the same mistakes over and over again? Come on Saturday June 22nd to watch demo riders from Intro-4th Level, and listen to commentary from our judge. This is an open forum event, and we welcome the audience to ask every question you've ever wanted to know!

Day 2 will be a Fix-a-Test opportunity. Ride the test that's giving you trouble or test out a new level without the show cost. After the ride, Cheryl will give you feedback and tips to better your score. You will then be given the opportunity to redo the test. This is an excellent chance to see if you're ready to move up a level or ask for help on movements that you are struggling with.

Cost:

Stalls are available for \$40 a night.

Day 1 Auditing is \$45 for adults and \$25 for Juniors (20 years old and younger); discounts given for auditing/riding both days.

Day 2 Fix-a-Test Clinic is \$65 per spot (9 - 45 minute spots available)

Stalls are available for \$40 a night, no stall stripping required.
