Terry brings a wealth of information to her clinics and she is always a hit with riders. Come join the fun!


#### **MDA Used Tack Sale!**

#### Midwest Dressage Association Professionals Grant Program

This grant program has been established to assist those who are professional members of the Midwest Dressage Association to further their education in the following areas: Teaching, Training, and Judging.

The MDA Board of Directors shall set aside from the general fund the sum of \$1,500.00 (the grants of \$500 each) at the beginning of each calendar year. Applicants must meet the following requirements:

- -A minimum of two consecutive years of membership (in good standing) with the Midwest Dressage Association.
- -Four hours of volunteer time documented with the MDA within the 12 months preceding the filing of a grant supplication.
- -A letter of recommendation from one student
- -A letter of recommendation from a professional horseperson (trainer, judge or instructor)

Approved educational opportunities would include the following:

All clinics, seminars, and educational programs offered and/or sponsored by the Midwest Dressage Association, the United States Dressage Federation, and/or the United States Equestrian Federation. These educational opportunities will be brought to the MDA Board of Directors on a case by case basis.

The maximum grant to be awarded to any one person shall be limited to \$500.00. The board may approve any grant request for less than the requested amount. No one person shall receive more than one grant per calendar year.

Should said recipient fail to attend the specified event all grant money is to be refunded to the Midwest Dressage Association within 30 days after the date of specified event. Terms and conditions are subject to change on an annual basis.

No sitting member of the Board of Directors of the Midwest Dressage Association is eligible for these grants.

#### Health Notes...

### From the farrier

As we all know our horses are only as good as the feet that they're standing on. Having strong, healthy hooves can make or break our equine partners. This month we had the opportunity to pick the brain of one of southeastern Michigan's best-trained farriers, Jeremy McKenzie and he outlined the things that he wants every horse owner to know.



**MDA:** What are some of the things that you want every horse owner to know about their horses' feet?

JM: I want every horse owner to know and keep track of their horses' hoof angles. This is important because it helps you understand more about your horses' way of going. If there is a change in your horses' angles you may notice a change in your horses' movement that could correlate with poor striding and correctness of gait. It could also be an indicator of future lameness.

**MDA:** Explain the benefits of putting steel plates on a horse versus a shoe with more tread.

JM: There are no real benefits of one versus the other, it all depends on the job being asked of the horse. However, if you have a horse with arthritic changes in its ankles for example, going in a flat plate will tend to put less stress on the joint as opposed to a shoe with tread which can cause more torque on the joint. But it also depends upon the riding surface. If your horse is going to be ridden in a sand ring most of the time, it wouldn't

necessarily benefit from tread whereas a horse that is worked more on natural surfaces like grass might need more traction.

**MDA:** What are some of the warning signs that something could be wrong with your horses' feet?

JM: Some of the things that you should watch for are persistent lameness with little to no heat and swelling in the leg. If your horses' way of going changes or if your horses' stride suddenly becomes a "stabbing" motion, that could be an indicator that there could be something brewing in the boney structures of the hoof. Also if there is heat around the coronet band it could be an indicator of an abcess. Above all, it's important that you give as much attention to your horses' feet as you do to tack and training.

Jeremy McKenzie is a farrier based in Manchester, MI. He trained with renowned farrier Allen Schmidt for many years before striking off on his own. Jeremy specializes in sporthorses and has worked with several noted Event and Dressage trainers.
